2. **Approval of April Meeting Minutes** [discussion and action]

Marna motions to approve minutes. Maysha seconds. Minutes are approved.

3. **Review and Consideration of Agenda** [discussion and action]

Maysha motions to approve agenda. Marna seconds. Agenda is approved.

4. **General Public Comment** - No Public Comment

5. **Community Check In** [discussion and possible action]

Maysha Bell – Many families will be participating in the Together Initiative. Trying to get SFUSD students taped into in person and virtual support. Want to make sure that information is disseminated, and families will be receiving stipends to participate. During the summer months would like to ensure that the communities of color participate.

6. **House Keeping** [discussion and possible action]

- a. BOS SDDTAC Budget Rx Presentation Update

Staff shared that DPH reached out to DPH governmental liaison to schedule meeting with the BOS to present SDDTAC budget recommendations. Member shared that co-chairs spoke with Katie Ettman of SPUR

to possibly assist with setting up meetings with individual board of supervisors. Staff clarified that a budget presentation would be either for a committee of the Board of Supervisors or the full Board of Supervisors, which has not happened before. In the past Friends of the Soda Tax, including SPUR as lead, set up meetings with District Supervisors, where committee members joined meetings and provided background and education of budget recommendations. This has worked in the past, worked well and has been helpful as there was an outside entity to coordinate. Member expressed the possibility of the new co chair to present the budget recommendations since chair may not feel comfortable in doing so. It is advised to schedule and prep for the meetings as member is unsure of what has been represented in the past. Member shared that there has been other meetings this month where organizations are meeting with Board of Supervisors to present budget presentations outside of what the SDDTAC has recommended. Members want to make sure what they are presenting to the board and to be well informed. Staff is unaware of what happened in those past meetings but can point out to members about comparison of SDDTAC recommendations, Mayor's Office recommendations and Board of Supervisors' budget recommendations. Staff can provide context and walking through budget context if helpful. Likely we will not get to present to the Board of Supervisors by June 1st. If meetings are being set up this year and if it would be a possibility if former members would be able to participate in those meetings since new members have come onboard. Member suggested to also include organizations and community members to speak and present as well to include their priorities and not just those of the SDDTAC.

b. Seat 15 Update

Seat 15 (SFUSD Parent Advisory Council) - Dianna Cavagnaro approved at today's Board of Supervisors meeting. Nominated by the SFUSD Parent Advisory Council and will be joining May SDDTAC meeting.

7. **Community Input Subcommittee Chair Nominations** [discussion and possible action]

Vanessa is on leave and members make nominations for community input subcommittee chair. Marna nominates Maysha. Maysha accepts nomination. Jennifer would not accept the nomination, if nominated.

Marna motions to nominate Maysha Bell for Community Input Subcommittee Chair. Jennifer seconds. The motion passes, Maysha Bell is the is the new chair for the community input subcommittee.

8. **Review of SDDTAC Legislation Edits** [discussion and possible action]

a. SDDTAC Youth Seat Amendment Process Update [discussion and possible action]

Staff provides background on SDDTAC legislation changes coming from youth seat amendment discussions. Kiana and Vanessa initially started youth seat amendment changes. When new SDDTAC members onboarded, the issue of seats 1-3 regarding representation was brought up. Staff noted that at the hearing for Seat 15, Supervisor recognized the SDDTAC has taken the approach in designating the community equity seats and understands how it was set up. It was suggested to makes changes to the SDDTAC legislation. Staff reviews current and suggested changes to the legislation with subcommittee members and that changes would take effect in 2 years. Intent is to take changes to all subcommittees and present to at SDDTAC meeting and share edits with DPH and city attorney for review and write up with agreement from SDDTAC and DPH will take it to the Board of Supervisors to get changes adopted. Member asked why changes could not be done now. Member responded according to Robert's Rules of Order, there would be a process and systems change which would mean to remove current seat member and replace, removing a marginalized community seat representative for another marginalized community seat representative. Consideration if that is the best thing to do at this time with all things being considered. Staff continues to review amendments for youth seat, in addition SFUSD student, and include 3 additional seats for transitional aged youth and allow for more youth voices at the table and TAY seats would mirror community equity seats. Member asks if 3 TAY seats that do not need to be SFUSD, needs to be defined as TAY seats do not need to be SFUSD students to be more defined. Member agrees with addition of TAY seats, but would like more clarification around the TAY seats outnumbering the youth seat, would it be possible to

include an additional youth seats for a total of 2 youth seats for seat 6. Member also noted that the way the application is set up is that more students from private schools were aware of this opportunity rather than just SFUSD students. Member noted that it needs to be defined that (1) youth seat must be from SFUSD and/or (1) student from independent school and include stipends for youth seats. Members agree. Member asked about number of members to identify as even if a tie breaker is needed. Member agrees. Member asked to provide more clarification on what the SDDTAC legislation means about "if the person is under legal voting age and unable to be an elector." Staff will follow up with city attorney for clarification and definition. Member added that the SFUSD student board members they vote but it is not a deciding vote, considering the voting age, it might be something to consider. Staff notes that currently youth seats has same vote as other committee members. Current language on SDDTAC legislation needs to be defined. Staff continue to review changes to the legislation specific to membership. Context is to have community seats staggered so that turnover is not all at once for continuity, provide historical context and balance of community and city appointed seats. Staff reviews language regarding committee member compensation. Changes include compensation for youth seats using SDDT revenue. Member asked if seat 5, is required to represent the perspective of the entity they are employed? Staff responded that anyone sitting in seats 4-5 bring their experience and as resource of their employer and not necessarily the perspective of the institution they are employed at. It is suggested to include more clarification of ensuring that experiences of communities that are being represented rather than the agency one represents. Member suggests adding introduction of seats that seat representation should be for priority communities versus place of employer. Member adds it also get complications where seats are appointed by city departments. Member noted there is a difference between community seats which are voted on versus those who are appointed by city departments, etc., if that is the same across the board, it should be indicated in the legislation so that more is teased out so that applicants and members are more aware of their role and expectations. Member suggests to looking at other city soda tax advisory committees' legislation as SDDTAC continues to make changes and be vetted by the committee and community. Member will review notes from meeting on other soda tax committees and share with SDDTAC. There is no timeline on changes to the SDDTAC legislation but with respect with concern from API community, it is important to keep this moving forward and ensure that community members are able to review before any changes are adopted. Staff shares that SDDTAC is set to sunset in 2028 and if SDDTAC wants to consider revamping. Member adds to add in compensation language for new youth seats. Edits will be shared at the next SDDTAC meeting.

Description of intended purpose from Mayor's Budget

Community-Based Grants: Funding to issue grants to CBOs for programs and services in the following areas (1) Health Education, (2) Physical Activity, (3) Food Access, and (4) a Media/Awareness Campaign.

School Food, Nutrition Education, student-led action: Funding to (1) improve the quality of school meals, (2) support nutrition education, and (3) support student-led efforts to decrease consumption of SSBs and increase awareness around students.

Food Access: Healthy Food Purchasing Supplement

Healthy Retail: Will provide Healthy Store makeovers to 2 additional stores and continue ongoing providing support to 10 stores.

Oral Health school-based: Funding to support oral health in schools, including the cost of sealants.

Oral Health: Funding for Community Task Forces

Infrastructure: To fund a contract through DPH for facilitation and strategic support for the SDDTAC. Will also support research needs, including purchasing of data, and costs at DPH related to the administration of CBO grant program.

Water Access: One-time for the installation of water refilling stations in schools. Also can be used to purchase refillable water bottles for students.

SFRPD: Funding to Rec Park to provide continued support of the Peace Parks program.

Hope SF Peer Enhancements: Fund training and peer wage increases.

COMMUNITY-BASED GRANTS	City Departments should contract directly with CBOs through an RFP process managed through the Community Health Equity and Promotion (CHEP) Branch of the Department of Public Health. CBG should support community-based programs and services that address the health inequities of those most targeted by the beverage industry. Funding should go to Community Based Organizations (CBOs) and Faith Based Organizations (FBOs) for the following strategies:
Health education, food security, physical activity	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Health Education activities including, chronic disease prevention, healthy eating and active living, tap water promotion, oral/dental health 2. Physical Activity opportunities, including: a) Dance and movement, sports, yoga, walking groups, biking, etc.; b) Efforts to influence changes to the built environment (ie sidewalks, streets, parks, buildings, etc) or safety of the built environment that facilitates increased physical activity and walking and biking for utilitarian trips, sometimes referred to as active transportation); and c) pursuit of institutional or local policies that facilitate physical activity and active transportation (such as adequate PE time and instructors, commuter benefits for active transportation, etc) 3. Priority programs should incorporate a community-based food security perspective and have demonstrated increased ability of food insecure residents to purchase, access, and consume consumption of healthy, fresh, low-to-no cost and culturally appropriate foods, including but not limited to food vouchers/incentives, transportation and delivery and prepared foods.
