ORGAN DONATION BY JOE HERNANDEZ TO SAVE LIVES In tragedy, a way found to help others

San Francisco General Hospital and Trauma Center (SFGH) patient Joe Hernandez Friday gave the ultimate gift of life by donating organs to people in need in Northern and Central California.

The Hernandez family's decision to donate Joe's organs was a courageous and compassionate way to turn one person's tragedy into a life-saving moment for others.

"Joe was very healthy and wanted to save lives even in his death. It was something that was important to him," his family said in a statement.



Hernandez, 30, was a fourth-year medical student at UCSF who had recently trained at SFGH. He was transported to San Francisco General Hospital on Sunday January 9 in critical condition. He did not survive, and his family donated his organs because he had told them that was his choice.

"We are grateful to the Hernandez family for extending themselves to help others during this time of tremendous grief," said Sue Currin, CEO of SFGH. "Here at San Francisco General we encourage families to consider organ donation as a way to celebrate the life of their lost loved one by extending the lives of others."

Last year, 10 SFGH patients donated a total of 48 organs, saving many lives. The need is great. Nearly 21,000 Californians are awaiting organ transplants, according to the California Transplant Donor Network (CTDN).

"One donor can save the lives of up to 8 people with organs, and improve the lives of more than 50 people with tissue donations," said Cathy Olmo, Manager of Community Development at CTDN. "Some people in need have been waiting for years; unfortunately some cannot survive a long wait. For each of them, donation means another chance at life."
