#### **Seasonal Flu in the News: Protect Yourself and Others with Flu Vaccine**

Responding to an expected increase in the number of seasonal flu cases in San Francisco and throughout the Bay Area, we are reminding staff to do their part in helping to prevent the spread of the flu by getting a flu shot. Flu vaccines are available through your healthcare provider and at commercial outlets such as your local pharmacy, or at the health department's Adult Immunization & Travel Clinic located at 101 Grove St. Getting the flu vaccine can protect not just you, but everyone around you. Everyone aged 6 months or older should be vaccinated, but especially the very young and anyone with a chronic medical condition like asthma, heart disease, or diabetes. Flu vaccine is available as a shot or an intranasal (nose) spray. Each has its advantages. Your doctor may recommend one or the other for you depending on your age and your health. #### **New Engagement Specialist Team (EST) to Replace MAP Van**

Beginning January 1, 2013, I have directed the Homeless Outreach Team and Mobile Assistance Patrol to merge services to provide more efficient and targeted street outreach to our High Users of Multiple Systems (HUMS). This is a proactive effort with the goal of engaging vulnerable individuals into preventive and chronic care services before they require ambulance and police intervention. Based on a community care plan, EST staff will link them to care through safer housing and/or treatment programs that will stabilize the progression of their chronic diseases.

EST is comprised of experienced outreach workers, supervised by clinicians who have been working with these complicated patients for many years. EST will continue to transport patients to and from urgent/emergent services, but will now provide the added value of direct service. Through careful tracking, coordination, and wrap-around case management services—no matter where they present for help—we hope to be able to assist these individuals to improve the quality of their lives. In the first week of operation, EST has received positive feedback from San Francisco General Hospital and the Dore Urgent Care Center.

#### **Human Trafficking Awareness Month**

January 11<sup>th</sup> begins *Human Trafficking Awareness Month* in San Francisco. This annual campaign has been formally recognized by San Francisco elected leaders in 2010 and takes place each year nationally between January 11 (National Human Trafficking Awareness Day) and

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February 12 (Abraham Lincoln's birthday). In San Francisco, various city and community partners work together to educate the public about this issue of modern day slavery that occurs throughout the Bay Area and the world.

On January 15th, the San Francisco Collaborative Against Human Trafficking, the San Francisco Human Rights Commission and the Department on the Status of Women held a joint press conference in City Hall to announce the launch of San Francisco's 2013 Annual Human Trafficking Awareness Month.

### **2013 San Francisco Point-in-Time Homeless Count**

Every two years in January, communities across the country conduct comprehensive counts of their homeless population. This biannual census helps us gain a better understanding of the current homeless population and provides a basis on which to apply for federal funding for homeless programs. The results of this research also gives service providers, policy makers, funders, and local, state, and federal governments a better understanding of the needs of the homeless population by examining current statistics in various geographical contexts.

The San Francisco Homeless Count and Survey will take place on January 24<sup>th</sup>. We are looking for volunteers to help with a comprehensive count throughout the City that night, as well as a supplemental survey which will gather information from those experiencing homelessness.

A brief training will be conducted prior to deployment. The census routes are not extremely long and the actual time spent is approximately three hours. ### **Kelly Cullen Community: Newest Direct Access to Housing Site**

Over the holidays, the first 14 tenants moved into the new Direct Access to Housing program at Kelly Cullen Community. All tenants are homeless, extremely low-income individuals with great medical, behavioral health and housing needs and have a chronic mental health, substance use and/or physical health condition. Seventeen of the units are set aside for clients referred by

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the Mental Health Services Act. Currently, all applications are in process and the building will be fully occupied by the end of May.

Located in the Tenderloin at 220 Golden Gate Avenue at the corner Leavenworth Street, Kelly Cullen Community (KCC) is a 138,023 square foot, 9-story historic mixed-use building constructed in 1909 as a YMCA. The substantial rehabilitation scope, funded by a diverse mix of private and public as well as local, state and federal dollars, included the renovation of 172 efficiency units, all of which will house formerly-homeless persons with special needs, referred via the Direct Access to Housing program of the Department's Housing and Urban Health section. The development includes the restoration and preservation of a historic auditorium, gymnasium, lobby, atrium, and mezzanine; and the re-introduction of a grand entry staircase. Tenant amenities include lounges, laundry facilities, common kitchens, 24-hour front desk security, and a landscaped roof deck. The developer of KCC is Tenderloin

The developer, Tenderloin Neighborhood Development Corporation (TNDC), is the lead provider of onsite tenant services, heading up a collaborative team that includes the Department of Public Health's medical and clinical staff and money management by Lutheran Social Services. Jointly with DPH, TNDC competed for and secured a highly competitive Social Innovation Fund (SIF) grant provided through the Corporation for Supportive Housing. The grant will be used to fund the majority of the support services budget. The grant, which must be matched on a dollar-for-dollar basis in cash with non-federal funds, will pilot an innovative model of supportive housing that targets homeless high utilizers of crisis health services and offer an evaluation of the program. The subsidies at KCC are funded by the Mayor's Office on Housing's Local Operating Subsidy Program.

On the ground floor of the Kelly Cullen Community, DPH has developed and is leasing 11,000 square feet for its new Integrated Housing and Behavioral Health Clinic that will provide medical, psychiatric, and substance abuse services and will serve both KCC tenants and residents of San Francisco.

The Grand Opening of Kelly Cullen Community is being scheduled for later in March. As soon as we receive the invitation with the date, we will inform the Commissioners, hoping that many of them will be able to attend the celebration.

### ***Health Affairs* Features Employer Spending Requirement**

The January 2013 issue of *Health Affairs* features an article on implementation of the Employer Spending Requirement (ESR) provisions of the Health Care Security Ordinance. Researchers at Dartmouth, University of California at Berkeley and the University of Massachusetts at Amherst investigated employer response to the ESR.

Using survey data, they found that in the first two years after ESR implementation, more employers offered health insurance and provided employee coverage relative to non-San Francisco employers not subject to the mandate. In addition, they observed no crowd-out of private insurance with Healthy San Francisco as one of the health care expenditure options. They also found that while health care premium cost changes between 2007 and 2009 were similar in San Francisco and surrounding communities, more of the burden of premium contributions shifted from workers to employers in San Francisco. Finally, 64% percent of firms

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responding to the survey supported the ESR. This data and information is instructive as the employer provisions of the Affordable Care Act take effect January 2014.

### **Commissioner Chung Interviewed by TVB USA**

Commissioner Chung was recently interviewed by reporter Kenji Liu for a segment on transgender health. TVB USA is the largest distributor of Chinese-language television programs in the world. The segment ran on a number of stations throughout the Bay Area on Wednesday, January 9<sup>th</sup>. As soon as the station posts a link to the interview on their website, we will share it with the Commission. We are proud to have Commissioner Chung's role as a leader in the transgender community to help bring important messages and information to the public and the community.

### **Chinese New Year Stockton Street Pedestrian Enhancement Program**

For the second year in a row, the Department is working with a number of other City agencies to help manage the open space and protect pedestrians along the Stockton Street corridor during the Chinese New Year season. From January 26-February 9, the City is providing more space for merchants to display their goods by temporarily closing the parking lane along five blocks of Stockton from Broadway to Sacramento. Merchants must meet strict guidelines to participate and inspectors will be on hand to ensure compliance. The program proved very popular with the Chinese merchants and the community when it was launched in 2011. A copy of the flyer developed for the merchants is attached to the Director's Report.

### **Mass Prophylaxis Preparedness**

In November of 2012 the CDC reviewed the San Francisco Department of Public Health's *Medical Countermeasure Plan*. SFDPH received a perfect score on its Local Technical Assistance Review (TAR). According to the CDC, "SFDPH has built a strong medical countermeasures dispensing program as evidenced by the second consecutive 100 percent on the local TAR Tool. This year's score continues to showcase the aggressive actions of SFDPH planners and their close collaboration with other San Francisco City and County agencies and departments." It is gratifying to hear such high praise from federal agencies that we are maintaining an exceptional level of preparedness for responding to emergencies.

### **Corner Store Project: Healthier Foods Coming to Bayview District**

A major effort to bring healthier foods to San Francisco's Bayview District is underway. Supported by Kaiser Permanente's Bayview HEAL Zone initiative, two Bayview corner stores are getting healthy store makeovers to make it easier for residents to buy and prepare healthier foods for their families. In a step toward a major effort to make Bayview a healthier place to live, the Southeast Food Access (SEFA) Food Guardians are giving local corner stores the tools and support they need to make their businesses assets to the community. The Food Guardians are young Bayview residents fighting for healthier food and equity in their community.

Bayview residents suffer from diet-related disease such as diabetes and heart disease at much higher rates than other San Francisco residents. There is limited access to healthy food for people to buy and prepare in Bayview and the availability of fresh produce is limited and is outweighed by fast food and liquor stores selling a variety of unhealthy sugary and salty snacks. While food

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stores and restaurants exist, they most often sell cheap, unhealthy foods, and the types of fresh foods many San Franciscans take for granted are difficult to find.

I will be on hand to attend the official launch of the effort takes place January 24<sup>th</sup> from 10 a.m. to noon at **Lee's Market**, 1397 Revere Avenue (at Jennings Street). The Commissioners are welcome to join us.



### **Giant Sweep Campaign**

The Department of Public Health will be helping to support Mayor Lee's Giant Sweep campaign, a citywide anti-litter campaign lead by the Department of Public Works to clean up San Francisco and change public behavior. The Giant Sweep theme is based on the 2012 Giants who showed us that winning the World Series was team effort. The same approach is needed to attack San Francisco's litter problem. Giant Sweep will take

place four times over the year as a nod to the Giants' four-game sweep of the Detroit Tigers in the 2012 World Series. Each citywide event will cover two days: Fridays reserved for schools; Saturdays for neighborhoods.

DPH will be promoting the neighborhood clean-up days and encouraging staff to participate as residents or as employees who work in the City for the City. Litter is not just an aesthetic quality-of-life issue; it affects the health of every community and the people who live there. A clean community is a healthy community. The Giant Sweep kicks off on February 8th at Lincoln High School with a District Clean-Up Day scheduled for February 9th in Districts 3, 4, 6 and 10. More details about Clean-Up Days will be forthcoming throughout the year. I urge everyone to volunteer some time to help keep San Francisco litter free.

### **Employee Assistance Program (EAP )**

The Employee Assistance Program (EAP) has released its schedule of upcoming Brown Bag workshops for January to March, 2013. (See attached). The Commissioners and staff are encouraged to review the classes and attend those that may be of interest or prove helpful. The EAP also offers a number of important services throughout the year. Here are some highlights:

- **EAP Orientations:** All City employees need to know about their EAP's services and how to access this free employee benefit. Contact the EAP to schedule.
- **Counseling Services:** EAP provides brief, solution-focused counseling for City/County employees, family members and significant others.
- **Consultations with Supervisors and Managers:** Consult about any workplace concerns.
- **Mediations to resolve workplace conflicts, and Critical incident Stress Debriefings** to help employees deal with any workplace trauma.

# Stockton Street Pedestrian Enhancement Program for Chinese New Year 2013

San Francisco's Chinatown is one of the most compact and visited neighborhoods in the City. During the Chinese New Year, the streets and sidewalks along Stockton Street in the heart of the vibrant commercial corridor experience a high volume of pedestrian activity.

In an effort to maximize open space and enhance the pedestrian experience in Chinatown during the Chinese New Year, the City, in partnership with local businesses, will provide more space for merchants to display their goods by temporarily closing the parking lane along five blocks of **Stockton Street, from Broadway to Sacramento streets**. The program runs from January 26, 2013 to February 9, 2013.

During this period, curbside parking will be prohibited in the program area between the hours of 9 a.m. and 7 p.m. This year's initiative builds on a successful demonstration project last year.

The Stockton Street Merchandise Display Program will allow merchants to occupy the parking spaces fronting their businesses to display merchandise, beginning January 26, 2013 and ending February 9, 2013. The program boundary runs along Stockton Street, from Broadway to Sacramento streets. **The following guidelines must be met to ensure compliance with City laws, safety, and uninterrupted pedestrian traffic.**

#### Merchant Display Guidelines:

- Merchandise set up will be from 9 -10 a.m., and take down will be from 6-7 p.m.
- Merchandise set up and take down will occur every day; merchandise **cannot** be stored overnight on sidewalks or in alleyways.
- Merchandise displays are only for fronting business owners, no subleasing of space is allowed.
- All transactions must occur inside the retail establishment.
- Merchandise must be displayed facing the stores.
- Display items must be placed against the curb; there should be no space between the curb and the merchandise.
- The public must remain on the sidewalk when purchasing items.
- No pedestrians are allowed on the street or in merchandise-display area.
- Pedestrians must have at least 6 feet of space to walk along the sidewalks.
- No cut fruit, shelled nuts, raisins or other dried fruits or seafood are allowed in merchant-display area.
- Packaged foods are allowed in merchant-display area but must be covered by a tent or canopy.
- No food can be stored on the ground and must be on pallets or tables.

#### Parking and Traffic:

- Deliveries must be scheduled before 9 a.m. or after 7 p.m.; no delivery trucks will be able to park or stop on Stockton Street between 9 a.m. to 7 p.m.
- Double-parking is **not allowed** along Stockton Street or any streets that feed into Stockton Street. This policy will be **strictly enforced** during scheduled program hours. The fine for double-parking is \$110.
- Alleyways must remain accessible and clear for cleaning and emergencies.

The Stockton Street Pedestrian Enhancement Program is collaboration between the Chinatown community and City agencies, including the Department of Public Works, the Municipal Transportation Agency, Mayor's Office, Department of Public Health, the Police Department, and the Chinatown Neighborhood Association, Chinese Chamber of Commerce, Chinese American Association of Commerce, Chinatown Merchants Association, and Community Youth Center.

# ~ New Transportation Programs to Replace Map Van ~ ~ Engagement Specialist Team to begin January 1, 2013 ~

**High Users of Multiple Systems (HUMS) Targeted Outreach:** Beginning January 1, 2013, members of the San Francisco Homeless Outreach Team (SFHOT) and the Mobile Assistance Patrol (MAP) will merge to provide targeted street outreach with the goal of more effectively engaging and placing into care San Francisco's most vulnerable street population – the men and women who are HUMS. This team will be known as EST, the SFHOT Engagement Specialist Team.

HUMS individuals are chronically homeless and often suffer persistently from severe alcohol disorders, brutal living conditions, chronic medical problems, and serious mental illnesses. HUMS clients have extremely high rates of premature mortality, create adverse effects on certain geographic areas of the city, and result in high costs to the health system. Strategic, targeted outreach will focus on (1) locating and engaging or reengaging HUMS clients into care according to their community care plan, (2) coordinating with their care managers, and (3) transporting them with warm hand-offs into safer housing and/or treatment programs that will stabilize the progression of their chronic diseases. Careful tracking, coordination, and follow-through with their care, no matter where they appear for services, will enable us to proactively intervene and help them to improve the quality of their lives. We will move away from strictly providing transportation services to a team of specialists who will engage with clients to improve treatment linkage and follow-through.
