# Grant Overview

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- 26-month pre-booking diversion program
- \$5.9 million award
- Aims to reduce criminal behavior and improve public safety by connecting low-level drug offenders with the City's robust network of health and social services
- Will reach at least 250 individuals (and divert at least 100) in the Tenderloin and Mission neighborhoods by June 2019

# Goals of BSCC LEAD Grant

- 3. Improve health and housing status** of LEAD participants

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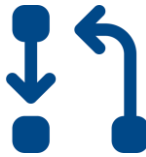

**Policy Committee** – Monthly meetings through August 2017, then quarterly meetings  
*Oversees LEAD design, implementation, and evaluation*



**Law Enforcement Workgroup** – Monthly meetings through August 2017  
*Provides technical expertise and recommendations to the policy committee*



**Operational Workgroup** – Monthly meetings starting in July 2017  
*Leads project implementation and service delivery and operates as a multidisciplinary team*



**Communications Workgroup**  
*Coordinates information flow among project stakeholders and the community*

# Law Enforcement Workgroup Considerations

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## *Issue 1: Focused Catchment Areas for Pilot*

Recommendation: Start at UN Plaza/Civic Center BART Station & Mission Hot Spot/16<sup>th</sup> Street BART Station

## *Issue 2: Team Approach to Lead Referrals among pilot hotspots*

Recommendation: Coordinated Team on the street SFPD, BART PD, Glide and Felton

# Law Enforcement Workgroup Considerations

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## *Issue 3: Eligible Crime types*

Recommendation: Use preliminary list prepared by DA as baseline guidelines

## *Issue 4: Officer justification for LEAD referral*

Recommendation: Use a behavioral checklist that could accompany reporting to reinforce decision in the field
