

Discussion Document for SF Food Security Task Force – Reauthorization discussion – April 4, 2018

Authorizing legislation: SF Ordinance 88-15 (Health Code [Sections 470.1 and 470. 2] extends the Food Security Task Force until July 1, 2018)

Purpose of the task force:

1. Increase participation in federally funded food programs.
 - requires annual assessment of food security in SF with recommendations for funding, policy and programs; and bi-annual updates in making progress
2. Task Force shall also provide general advice and assistance to the Board of Supervisors with regard to funding priorities, legislative action, and city policies on addressing hunger and enhancing food security.

Task Force may consist of up to 15 voting members

Such community members shall be nominated by the Task Force and may include but are not limited to representatives from organizations serving food in the following program types: home-delivered meals; congregate meals for seniors; food bank; free dining room; multi-service agency serving families and youth; shelter meals; and faith-based organizations, food retail (farmers markets; grocery stores); hospital and health clinics and a member of the public.
