2010 Registry Match Report for Chronic Hepatitis B, Hepatitis C Infection, and HIV

Recently the staff in the Communicable Disease Control & Prevention Section who maintain the Registry of Chronic Hepatitis (both HBV and HCV) worked with the HIV Epidemiology staff to see if they could link their respective registries. The effort resulted in the first of its kind *2010 Registry Match Report for Chronic Hepatitis B, Hepatitis C Infection and HIV*. The *Match Report* is providing us a unique opportunity to describe the epidemiology of individuals living in San Francisco who are co-infected with viral hepatitis and HIV. We are not looking just at co-morbidity, but also learning about the demographics of this cohort such as race and gender, as well as the risk factors for infection with HIV. The data is also useful in identifying who is at risk, where our screening and prevention efforts will be most effective and, ultimately, help us provide better treatment. DPH-HUH Permanent Supportive Housing Programs Awarded HUD Funding

The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) recently awarded San Francisco \$18.7 million in Continuum of Care grants to fund a variety of programs for homeless persons. DPH’s Housing and Urban Health (HUH) Section received \$1,192, 887 of San Francisco’s award for two of its permanent supportive housing programs: Direct Access to Housing (DAH) – Empress/Folsom Dore and DAH for Chronic Alcoholics. The recent award allows DAH – Empress/Folsom Dore to provide 88 units of permanent supportive housing to chronically homeless persons at two different sites.

HUD support also allows DAH for Chronic Alcoholics, originally funded through HUD’s Housing for People Who are Homeless and Addicted to Alcohol initiative in 2005, to serve 62 unaccompanied adults with long-term, disabling addictions to alcohol. Both DAH programs have met with success since their inception, boasting high retention rates and improved health outcomes among tenants. Recently awarded funds will be available for each program’s 2011/12 HUD operating year and will be subject to renewal through the HUD McKinney Vento Continuum of Care application process.

Tobacco Control Report Card

San Francisco received a “B” on the *American Lung Association 2010 State of Tobacco Control* report card which graded every California city and county based on local tobacco control laws and regulations in effect as of January 2, 2011. Grades are assigned based on three categories: smoke-free outdoor air, smoke-free housing, and reducing sales of tobacco products. San Francisco’s 2009 “C” grade was improved to a “B” thanks to the passage of a comprehensive second hand smoke ordinance that went into effect in October 2010, expanding protection in outdoor dining, building entryways, farmers markets, service areas, and waiting

lines. The new ordinance also banned smoking in enclosed common areas of multi-unit dwellings. Out of the ten California cities with the largest populations, only San Francisco and Oakland received “B’s” and none received an “A”.

While California received an “A” for its smoke-free air policies, it got an overall “F” due to its inadequate funding of tobacco prevention and control programs, poor coverage of smoking cessation treatments and services, and its low 87 cent/pack cigarette tax which now ranks 33rd in the nation. The national average is \$1.45.

Stop Smoking Program Referrals begin using E-Scheduler

In November 2010, the Health Commission recognized a team of employees from Community Health Prevention and Promotion and Community Oriented Primary Care (COPC) for their work developing a standardized tobacco use assessment and referral protocol that incorporated existing technology from the Lifetime Clinical Record (LCR) and e-referral systems.

Staff from the Tobacco Free Project worked with the Center for Innovation in Access and Quality at SFGH to develop the policies and procedures for the e-referral system. The e-scheduler component of the e-referral system was launched during January. Through it, providers can refer identified smokers to seven available on-site stop smoking programs coordinated by the Tobacco Free Project Stop Smoking Program. Stop smoking classes are available in English, Chinese, Spanish and Russian.

SFUSD High School Students to Try Out *Grab n Go Breakfasts*

Last week, the California Department of Education awarded \$108,606 to the San Francisco Unified School District (SFUSD) to roll out a *Grab n Go Breakfast* model in nine high schools. The Department’s Environmental Health section was the lead agency in this effort and worked with SFUSD Student Nutrition Services to submit applications for Breakfast Expansion Grants.

Breakfast Expansion Grant funds will be used to purchase mobile Points of Service, food carts, and marketing and outreach materials. Environmental Health will work with Student Nutrition Services to get the program up and running and then evaluate it. For more information, contact Paula Jones, paula.jones@sfdph.org.

Medical Student Family Donates Organs

The Commissioners will recall the news surrounding UCSF fourth year medical student Joe Hernandez, who was transported to SFGH in critical condition on January 9. Sadly, he did not survive. What makes his death more poignant is that Joe Hernandez was an organ donor. Working closely with the Hernandez family and the CA Transplant Donor Network, SFGH surgeons were able to complete the organ donation process. We are extraordinarily grateful to the Hernandez family who, even during their time of grief, allowed this compassionate act on behalf of their son. If you have not already done so, I urge the Commissioners and members of the public to join the seven million Californians who have signed up to be an organ and tissue donor. Medical Cannabis Operating Permit Suspended

In response to a fire that started in the office of Nor-Cal Herbal Relief Patient's Cooperative at 1545 Ocean Ave, fire officials discovered an illegal cannabis growing operation run by the Cooperative in the upstairs residential unit of the building. At a subsequent DPH hearing, the operating permit was suspended for 30 days, which is the maximum suspension allowed under the Health Code. The facility may reopen after 30 days if all violations have been corrected. The cooperative is hopeful that they will be able to correct all violations within the 30 day suspension and continue to serve their members.

Public Health Lab Awarded Grant

The San Francisco Department of Public Health Lab, located at 101 Grove St., was awarded

\$33,000 by the Association for Public Health Laboratories to investigate the expanded use of molecular tests for tuberculosis.

PUC Grant for LHH

Laguna Honda has been awarded a \$600,000 water conservation grant from the San Francisco Public Utilities Commission. The hospital will use the grant to make landscape improvements to its front lawn and to add a walking path in the Betty Sutro Meadow in the Clarendon Valley. The landscaping projects are being designed to decrease water use and provide greater resident and community access to open areas on the campus.

City College Partnership

The opening of the new Laguna Honda Hospital facility has enhanced our relationship with many community organizations. This has been especially true with Laguna Honda's partnership with City College of San Francisco. Instructors from CCSF are now teaching Tai Chi, exercise, painting, and ceramics on the Laguna Honda campus. The classes are open to all San Francisco residents. Activity Therapist Alice Wong is managing the collaboration.

DPH Participates in AHA 2020 Task Force for Cardiovascular Health

On January 25, the American Heart Association launched its regional 2020 Task Force. The goal of the task force is to improve cardiovascular health by 20% by 2020, with an emphasis on addressing the protective factors of healthy eating and physical activity. Christina Goette, Community Health Promotion and Prevention, represented DPH at the meeting. She was asked to present to the group on the impact the environment has on individuals' choices. She also shared *Shape Up SF's Rethink Your Drink* campaign to reduce consumption of sweetened beverages and *Southeast Food Access Working Group's* efforts to increase access to healthy food in the BVHP.

Curtis Chan, MD, Appointed MCAH Medical Director

Please join me in welcoming Curtis Chan, MD, MPH, as the new Medical Director for Maternal, Child & Adolescent Health. Dr. Chan served as Medical Epidemiologist for Communicable Disease Control and Prevention from 2005-06, before serving as Assistant Health Officer for San Mateo County from 2006-10 where his focus was community health promotion and chronic disease prevention. He has also maintained clinical practice by providing primary care at UCSF, precepting at SFGH Children's Health Center, and providing newborn/inpatient care at St Luke's. Dr. Chan completed medical school, a pediatrics residency, and a preventive medicine residency at UCSF. Dr. Chan envisions collaborating with colleagues and community partners to build programs and policies that transform San Francisco into the world's healthiest city for children. Bhatia Participates in White House Council on Environmental Quality

On December 15th, 2010, the Obama administration hosted a daylong symposium on Environmental Justice programs aimed at improving the health and environmental integrity of the nation's often-neglected poorer communities. The forum, organized by the White House Council on Environmental Quality (CEQ), included representatives from major federal agencies and focused on green jobs, healthy neighborhoods and communities, and climate change adaptation. Speakers included Environmental Protection Agency administrator Lisa P. Jackson, Attorney General Eric Holder, Secretary of the Interior Ken Salazar, Secretary of Labor Hilda Solis, Secretary of Health and Human Services Kathleen Sebelius, and Secretary of Homeland Security Janet Napolitano. Rajiv Bhatia, MD, Director of Environmental Health section, was invited by CEQ to attend the forum and share lessons from the Department's healthy urban planning initiatives during the Healthy Communities and Place-Based Initiatives Session.

Ms. Garcia noted that the Commissioners received a memo at the meeting (Attachment A) that gives a brief update on health care reform.

4) GENERAL PUBLIC COMMENT

There was no public comment.

5) FINANCE AND PLANNING COMMITTEE REPORT

Commissioner Steven Tierney, Chair stated that the Committee approved the monthly Contracts report and two separate contracts to be brought to the full Commission for approval. The Committee heard updates on the status of Lyon-Martin Health Center and the impending closure of Positive Directions Equals Change. In addition, CPMC gave a quarterly update and Gregg Sass, DPH Chief Financial Officer, gave presentations on the 4th Quarter Financial Report and the DPH 5-Year budget process.

Action Taken: The Contracts Report was unanimously approved.

Action Taken: The Contracts with TP Windows, Inc. and Zylmira Ivonne Garcia were unanimously approved.

6) ELECTION OF HEALTH COMMISSION OFFICERS

Action Taken: The Health Commissioners unanimously elected Commissioner Melara as Vice President of the Health Commission.

Action Taken: The Health Commissioners unanimously elected Commissioner Tierney as President of the Health Commission.

The Commissioners commended and thanked Commissioner Illig and Commissioner Chow for their leadership and service during the past year.

7) RESOLUTION HONORING FLORENCE STROUD

Commissioner Waters read the draft resolution (Attachment B).

Commissioner Chow made a motion to amend the draft resolution changing the word "implementation" to "inauguration" in the sentence, "The Health Commission acknowledges and honors Florence Stroud for her lifelong commitment and dedication to improving the lives of others through her invaluable public health work; and supports the inauguration of the Annual Florence Stroud Conference Series,"

Commissioners Chow, Illig and Sanchez reflected on the many contributions that Ms. Stroud made to the San Francisco public health communities.

Action Taken: The revised resolution was unanimously passed.

8) BUDGET UPDATE

Gregg Sass, Chief Financial Officer made the presentation.

The following are highlights of the discussion of this item:

The term "structural costs" is a catch-all phrase used for items like premium pay, overtime pay and/or step increases for staff.

In regard to backfilling grant-funded positions when the grants expire, Mr. Sass stated that the DPH considers each situation separately; prior to applying for funding of a grant, the DPH staff discusses how the grant-

funded services fit into the service system and the impact if the service is funded and then closed when the grant ends.

The administration overhead allowances on DPH grants funds staff working in DPH grants management and other DPH administrative positions.

Commissioner Comments/Follow-Up:

Commissioner Chow stated that it is important to distinguish the different types of grants: those that assist in delivering services that are necessary; time-specific grants that fund a service for a specific period of time; and grants that fund experimental paradigms to explore new models of care. If these models work, the Commission and the DPH would like to find a way to fund the more effective service models.

Commissioner Melara stated that City government needs to be better educated about the benefits of receiving federal grants. These grants usually require some contribution from the General Fund to augment the federally funded services but the impact is exponentially effective.

Commissioner Tierney stated that budget issues will continue to be discussed further at future Finance and Planning Committee meetings.

9) LAGUNA HONDA HOSPITAL (LHH)TRANSITION UPDATE

Mivic Hirose, Executive Administrator, gave the presentation which reviewed the goals and outcomes of the Laguna Honda Hospital resident move during December, 2010.

Commissioner Tierney asked Ms. Hirose to elaborate on the method of training for the volunteers and staff who assisted with the move. Ms. Hirose stated that Bill Frazier who oversees the LHH volunteer services activities, coordinated several trainings prior to and on the morning of the move. In addition to LHH staff, volunteers included UCSF School of Nursing, City College, and San Francisco State University nursing students in addition to several retired LHH nurses.

Commissioner Illig commended Ms. Hirose and the LHH staff for the successful move. He asked for the reasons why LHH has shifted residents from eating three meals at the galleys. Ms. Hirose stated that because so many new procedures and systems have been introduced as part of the move, residents and staff have needed more time to acclimate before reintroducing galley dining for three meals a day. Prior to the move, residents had dined at their beds and therefore, getting them out of bed and to the galley for each meal is a significant change. Currently, residents are eating in the galleys once a day for lunch; in upcoming months, breakfast and dinner galley dining will be reintroduced.

10) JAIL HEALTH SERVICES UPDATE

Joe Goldenson M.D., Director introduced other Jail Health Services (JHS) Executive Staff present: Frank Patt, JHS Deputy Director, Tanya Weisheit, Deputy Director of Jail Psychiatric Services, and Kate Monico-Klein, Director of the Forensic AIDS Project. Dr. Goldenson made the presentation.

The following are highlights of the discussion of this item:

- Approximately ninety percent of the San Francisco County jail inmates are San Francisco residents.
- There are approximately 20,000 individuals who are incarcerated in the County jails throughout each year. The jails hold approximately 2,000 individuals on any given day.
- There are two patterns regarding the general average length of incarceration: one group is generally released within a few days and the other stays an average of five or six months.
- There a fifty percent recidivism rate.

- The Jails currently do not have the resources to thoroughly treat and link inmates to the substance abuse services they need. However, methadone is provided to inmates through a contract with the Bayview Hunter's Point Foundation.
- There are not adequate resources to implement discharge planning for the general population (without HIV or mental health issues).
- Eligible Inmates are not signed up for Health San Francisco while they are incarcerated because there are not staff available and because Healthy San Francisco prefers that people take the first step to sign-up on their own which results in provider appointments being used more efficiently.
- JHS is not accredited by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations because the Sheriff's Department is not able to meet the standards for exercise and recreation.
- JHS will be linked to Eclinical in a future phase of the project.

Commissioner Comments/Follow-Up

Commissioner Waters stated that she and Commissioner Illig took a tour of the Jails and were both pleased with the range of innovative and high quality services offered to inmates. Dr. Goldenson invited the other Commissioners to take a tour sometime in the near future.

Commissioner Tierney commended JHS and Jail Psychiatric Services for the very low rate of only one suicide in the last seven years.

Commissioner Sako requested an ongoing update on which divisions and units are getting linked to Eclinical.

Commissioner Sako also expressed concern in hearing that the JHS client population continues to be considerably sicker than the general San Francisco population and suggested that the Commission consider looking at this issue for a future policy discussion.

Commissioner Tierney thanked Dr. Goldenson for the presentation and for the ongoing effective work with the jail population.

11) OTHER BUSINESS

JOINT CONFERENCE COMMITTEE REPORTS

Commissioner Illig, who chaired the 1/25/11 Laguna Honda (LHH) JCC meeting, stated that at the meeting, the Committee heard a preview of the presentation on the LHH Transition Update. It also discussed the revised Gift Fund policy which will be an item on the 3/1/11 full Commission agenda. Commissioner Sako volunteered to work with the LHH staff to format Gift Fund updates for future LHH JCC meeting presentations.

Commissioner Illig also recognized the San Francisco State Masters of Social Work students in attendance.

Date: February 1, 2011

The following provides an update of implementation of federal Health Reform law in light of the January 31, 2011 ruling of U.S. District Court Judge Roger Vinson (Northeastern District of Florida).

The ruling does not change the federal Health Reform law. Implementation of the law continues and the Obama Administration has indicated that it will appeal Judge Vinson's decision to the U.S. Court of Appeals. The State of California has indicated that it continues to implement Health Reform based on the current law.

The Federal Lawsuit (Northeastern District of Florida)

On the same day that President Obama signed The Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act as amended by the Health Care and Education Reconciliation Act of 2010 into law on March 23, 2010, the State of Florida filed a federal lawsuit challenging its unconstitutionality (Case No.: 3:10-cv-91-RV/EMT).

It was joined in the lawsuit by 25 other states (initially 19 and later 6 others), two private citizens and the National Federation of Independent Business. The 26 states are Alabama, Alaska, Arizona, Colorado, Florida, Georgia, Idaho, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Louisiana, Maine, Michigan, Mississippi, Nebraska, Nevada, North Dakota, Ohio, Pennsylvania, South Carolina, South Dakota, Texas, Utah, Washington, Wisconsin, and Wyoming.

The case was assigned to Judge Vinson who, on January 31, 2011, ruled on two counts:

1. that the individual mandate component of Health Reform is unconstitutional and
2. that entire Health Reform law is unconstitutional.

Judge Vinson's ruling is more sweeping in that it considers the entire law to be void even though his decision found only the individual mandate provision constitutional. Judge Vinson did not grant plaintiffs' request to suspend implementation of Health Reform or to strike the Medicaid expansion provisions of Health Reform.

Other Court Rulings and Likely U.S. Supreme Court Review

In addition to Judge Vinson's ruling, 15 other federal district courts have been asked to rule on the constitutionality of the Health Reform Law:

- 12 courts dismissed the challenges,
- 2 courts held that the individual mandate did not violate the Commerce Clause in *Liberty Univ., Inc. v. Geithner* (Western District of Virginia) and *Thomas More Law Center v. Obama* (Eastern District of Michigan) and
- 1 court held that the individual mandate violated the Commerce Clause in *Virginia v. Sebelius* (Eastern District of Virginia). [The Obama Administration has indicated that it is also appealing this decision.]

It is anticipated that the legality and constitutionality of Health Reform will be taken up by the U.S. Supreme Court irrespective of any decision rendered by a U.S. Court of Appeals because: (1) any ruling of the U.S. Court of Appeals will likely be appealed, (2) the conflicting U.S. District Court rulings and (3) Health Reform impacts a significant number of Americans.

Status of the Health Reform

The Health Reform law is still in effect. The Obama Administration has indicated its belief that Judge Vinson's ruling is "well out of the mainstream of judicial opinion," "judicial overreaching" and at "odds with establish Supreme Court law." The Obama Administration has indicated that it will appeal Judge Vinson's decision to the U.S. Court of Appeals. It is also appealing the decision in *Virginia v. Sebelius*.

In mid-January 2011 Republican leadership in the U.S. House of Representatives passed legislation to repeal Health Reform. This was largely viewed as symbolic since the legislation is not expected to pass the U.S. Senate and, if it did pass, would be vetoed by President Obama. Judge Vinson's ruling will likely add fuel to this Republican effort.

In addition, it has been reported that legislation may be introduced in Congress that would allow states to obtain exemptions from Health Reform's Medicaid expansion, the individual health coverage requirement and the employer-sponsored coverage mandate. Needless to say, if these were to pass and were enacted, the Health Reform law would be effectively gutted.

California Response to Ruling

Diana Dooley, Secretary of the California Health and Human Services Agency, has stated that the State will continue to prepare for Health Reform based on the current law.

HONORING AND ACKNOWLEDGING FLORENCE STROUD

WHEREAS, Florence Stroud, registered nurse, professor, public health researcher and administrator, was a groundbreaking Bay Area public health leader who championed the needs of the poor and People of Color;

WHEREAS, Ms. Stroud twice served as interim Director of the San Francisco Department of Public Health;

WHEREAS, the following is a summary of some of her other accomplishments:

- She was the first African American to serve as Health Director of the City of Berkeley;
- She taught nursing at the University of California San Francisco (UCSF) and was appointed head nurse of pediatrics at UCSF; she conducted research on health disparities and taught cultural sensitivity to health professionals;
- She was Deputy Director of the San Francisco Department of Public Health Community Health Services during the extremely complex and difficult early years of the HIV epidemic; she authored critical guidelines for the prevention of prenatal HIV transmission and the care of mothers, children and infants infected with HIV;
- She was the first registered nurse appointed to the Medical Board of California;
- She was former President of the California Board Medical Quality Assurance and Division of Licensing;
- She served as chairwoman of the California State Black Health Conference and the Berkeley Mental Health Advisory Board;
- She was Director of the Western Addition Early Childhood Education Project;

WHEREAS, Florence Stroud died on November 16, 2007;
