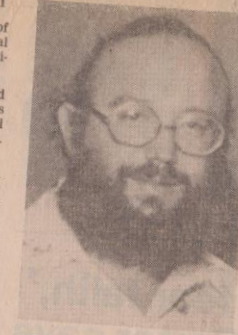
Given the current record of that committee, headed by frugal John Barbagelata, Fine is not optimistic.

"And that's an outrage," said Fine, who noted that The City was ordered to upgrade its jail medical facilities three years ago by U.S. District Judge Robert Schnacke.

Schnacke ruled that constitutional rights of inmates were being violated because of inadequate or non-existent medical facilities.

Earlier this year, an investigator for Schnacke found that minimum standards were still unmet and The City's plans for compliance are still subject of continuing court hearings, the next one next month.

and transportation costs are increasing, Peters said.

Not only that, the sheriff's department has also had its budget cut and funds for making special, emergency trips to Napa — like last week for the suicidal woman — are scarce.

Fine contended that it costs The City \$55 a day at Napa for each patient.

He also argued that the county would receive more funds from state and federal programs if inmate-patients were taken out of the criminal justice system and put into the public health system.

Moreover, Peters argued, there are serious medical questions that make local mental health care desirable.

The quality of care is better in the home community, he said, because it frequently allows making use of already established family and clinical contacts, it eliminates the stigma of being "put away in a state hospital," and removes the psychologically hazardous uprooting of the patient from familiar surroundings.

Fine was also critical of the supervisors for not spending more money to upgrade security measures at the temporary sixth floor jail ward in the new jail ward is not expected to be completed for sever-

Peters added that unless a mentally disturbed prisoner is acutely ill, he is kept in the jail. "We try to keep them medicated."

Fine is bitter about that: "They pump them full of dope and put them in strip cells. Or if they're really bad, they knock them out and send them to Napa. And they have no other choice because of the City's inaction."
