Behavioral Health Services Graduate Level Internship Program The goal is to train the next generation of public mental health care leaders who will provide patient-centered care to vulnerable populations through: 1) understanding and implementing relevant, evidence-based psychosocial rehabilitation and psychopharmacological treatments, 2) promoting recovery, and 3) developing rewarding public-academic partnerships.

This program works to train the next generation of public mental health care leaders who will provide children and adolescent-centered care to vulnerable populations with severe mental illness. This program provides fellowships throughout BHS' Child, Youth and Families System of Care.

This program provides training opportunities for psychology interns, masters-level trainees, nursing and nurse practitioner students (a student who is actively enrolled in a graduate program). Students are provided with weekly didactic training seminars at their local placements and several students attend the training seminars that are provided within our system of care.



Residency and Graduate Level Internship FY19/20 Outcomes

Fellowship Program for Public Psychiatry in the Adult System of Care and SF General Hospital

- Our fellows attended multiple external trainings.
- Our two fellows were both hired to work at SFHN-BHS clinics as the Associate Medical Director for Comprehensive Crisis Services and the other with the Behavioral Health Team within SF General.
- They are both preparing manuscripts for publication to *Psychiatric Services* and the *Journal of General Internal Medicine*.

Child and Adolescent Community Psychiatry Training Program -

CACPTP

We had four 2nd year Child and Adolescent Fellows, one fellow at each of the following clinics one afternoon a week:

- 1. Southeast Child Family Therapy Center
- 2. Chinatown Child Development Center
- 3. Family Mosaic Project
- 4. OMI Family Center

Behavioral Health Services Graduate Level Internship Program

- Our internship program provides training opportunities for approximately 40-60 psychology interns. Training topics include:
 - Dialectical Behavior Therapy
 - Solution-Focused Therapy
 - Attachment Theory
 - Motivational Interviewing
 - Cognitive Behavior Therapy
 - Suicide Assessment

Peer and Vocational Internship Programs



Peer-to-Peer Internship Programs Offers entry-level placements in peer-to-peer services. Peer interns work in a variety of DPH programs. The paid internships are nine months (20 hours/week) in duration. The peer interns are placed as:

- peer counselors
- system navigators
- support group co-facilitators
- resource linkage coordinators
- administrative support staff

Vocational Internship Programs Offers entry-level internships in the vocational and employment sector. These short-term placements are well supported with job coaching and workforce readiness support. Interns are placed in various placements including:

- basic construction
- janitorial
- mailroom and clerical
- café and catering
- Information Technology
- landscaping
- Other workforce placements

Peer and Vocational Internship Program FY19/20 Outcomes



Peer-to-Peer Internship Programs

- 81% of surveyed interns reported improvement in their overall quality of life.
- 100% of enrolled interns successfully completed the Peer Internship training.
- 78% reported an improvement in their ability to manage stress in the workplace.

Vocational Internship Programs

- 95% surveyed trainee IT Program graduates indicated improvement to their coping abilities.
- 100% of Janitorial Program respondents indicated increased readiness for additional meaningful activities (e.g. educational program, advanced training program, employment, etc.).
- 100% of Café/Catering interns reported an improvement in confidence to use the new skills learned.

FACES for the Future @ SFUSD John O'Connell High School

- Enrolled 50 students into on-campus, school-day embedded workforce development program
- 50 students completed (6) two-hour internship training workshops + twelve-hours of work-based learning
- Response to COVID-19 restrictions: students began participation online (Zoom workshops, career exploration via online platforms)
- Wellness Check-in's: Program
 Coordinator engaged with students

RAMS: Peer Specialist Mental Health Certificate Program & Advanced Course

- 19 students agree that after graduation,
 they plan to pursue a career in the mental
 health field of health & human services
- Peer Certificate Program Alumni & Current Students Reunions: facilitate inter- and intra-cohort professional networking + cultivate hope & wellness

City College of San Francisco: Community Mental Health Worker Certificate Program

- 17 students successfully completed the program
- 17 students successfully completed their internship requirements
- 100% of graduating students expressed readiness to pursue further education or a job within the community mental health field



City College of San Francisco: Addiction & Recovery Counseling Certificate Program

- 25 students received academic support + tutoring
- 25 students completed the first half (125 hours) of their internship fieldwork
- Retention of 25 students who are on schedule to petition for their certificate – graduation took place on May 21, 2020



Street Violence Intervention Program (SVIP) Professional Development Academy



FY13-14 through FY17-18

- 16-week program on Community Mental Health
- 10+ staff resume or pursue their continued education at City College of San Francisco

Resuming FY20-21

- SVIP Academy for new staff
- Advanced curricula for SVIP Director & Supervisors
- Networking between SVIP team & licensed clinical therapists in the community



Community Mental Health Academy

- Academy held for SOMA Youth Collaborative, HOPE SF Peer Health Leaders, Roadmap To Peace Care Managers, Case Managers who work with TAY experiencing homelessness & Native American Health Center staff
- 14 of twenty Academy students completed 16-week semester cycle
- Networking across participating agencies (e.g. housing, substance use support, mental health clinics)
- 100% of Academy students learned about mental health first aid, trauma informed care, crisis intervention, wellness & recovery
- 100% of Academy students learned how to respond to mental health distress situations + how to respond in culturally affirming ways, indigenous based stress reduction tactics
