**ENDORING THE CONTINUED EXPLORATION OF A PROPOSAL  
FOR THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HEALTH,  
SAN FRANCISCO GENERAL HOSPITAL, TO PROVIDE A WORKERS'  
COMPENSATION MEDICAL TREATMENT FACILITY**

WHEREAS, initial medical treatment of occupationally injured City and County of San Francisco employees has been provided by the St. Francis Hospital continuously since 1982; and,

WHEREAS, the February 1994 Management Audit of the Division of Workers' Compensation found opportunity for improvement in the provision of medical treatment for occupationally injured City and County employees; and,

WHEREAS, the Management Audit recommends that the contract to provide initial treatment for occupationally injured City and County employees be competitively bid; and,

WHEREAS, the development of the proposed workers' compensation treatment facilities will result in a new source of revenue for the Department of Public Health; and,

WHEREAS, the development of the proposed workers' compensation treatment facilities will facilitate and expedite the transition to a managed care environment; and,

WHEREAS, the development of the proposed workers' compensation treatment facilities at San Francisco General Hospital will result in workers' compensation cost savings for both the Department of Public Health and other City and County departments; and,

WHEREAS, the development of the proposed workers' compensation treatment facilities will assist in the implementation of Civil Service Rule 35, "Return to Work"; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED that the San Francisco Health Commission endorses the continued exploration of a proposal for the Department of Public Health/San Francisco General Hospital to provide workers' compensation medical treatment facilities for the City and County of San Francisco.
