**SUPPORTING THE SAN FRANCISCO
HEALTHY CITIES: MISSION IMMUNIZATION PROJECT**

WHEREAS, the City and County of San Francisco was officially designated as a California Healthy City on December 1, 1993, through its successful application to develop the San Francisco Healthy Cities: Tenderloin Immunization Project; and,

WHEREAS, the Tenderloin Immunization Project was dedicated to improving community outreach and education regarding the importance of immunization, and where this project will end on December 31, 1994; and,

WHEREAS, the Department is developing an application to renew its Healthy City designation by continuing the project's immunization focus, and shifting the coordination efforts to the Mission neighborhood; and,


WHEREAS, the rate of on-time immunizations for children under age two in San Francisco is 49%, and where the intent of the Healthy City focus for San Francisco is to explore creative avenues for community involvement and immunization education in several distinct neighborhoods; and,

WHEREAS, the mission of the California Healthy Cities Project is to improve the health status of California residents by increasing the use of the Healthy Cities model for the promotion of health by local leaders, professionals, and residents within communities throughout the State; and,

WHEREAS, the Health Commission has expressed consistent support for the Healthy Cities concept, and supports Department efforts to continuously improve immunization rates; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that the Health Commission supports the application by the Department of Public Health to the California Healthy Cities Project for renewal of San Francisco's designation as a California Healthy City, through its development of the Healthy Cities: Mission Immunization Project.
