RESOLUTION NO. 7-94

DETERMINING WHETHER THE CALIFORNIA PACIFIC MEDICAL CENTER'S STRATEGIC PLAN WILL OR WILL NOT HAVE A DETRIMENTAL IMPACT ON THE HEALTH CARE SERVICE OF THE COMMUNITY

WHEREAS, the move toward national and statewide health reform has necessitated that existing health care delivery systems develop capitated, managed care delivery models in order to compete for market share of patients, or risk losing a fundamental financial base in which to continue to be viable; and

WHEREAS, the California Pacific Medical Center has developed and completed a Strategic Plan, which addresses the conversion of its system to a new delivery model, and which includes a restructuring of the clinical configuration of its major campuses emphasizing outpatient services, including California and Pacific Campus reductions in staff; and,

WHEREAS, the California Pacific Medical Center has in good faith complied with the spirit of the Community Health Care Planning Ordinance (Proposition Q); and,

WHEREAS, on February 1, 1994 the Health Commission held a public hearing at which representatives of California Pacific Medical Center and the public presented testimony; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that based on the public hearing, the San Francisco Health Commission determines that the California Pacific Medical Center's Strategic Plan will be unlikely to have a detrimental impact on the health care service of the community; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, that the San Francisco Health Commission urges the California Pacific Medical Center's Board of Directors to address concerns regarding these changes as they arise, and to monitor the impact on services to the community as the Strategic Plan is implemented.
