
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How does workplace safety align with SFHN True North Metrics and LHH Strategic Goals?








- Goal: Zero Workplace Injuries
 - Target 1: 5% reduction in rate of recordable injuries per fiscal year
 - Target 2: Achieve a rate of recordable injuries that is below the national average for skilled nursing facilities (7.4 injuries per 100 FTE in 2014).
 - Specific interest in tracking injuries resulting from resident handling and workplace violence incidents

Note: Recordable injury rates are calculated using productive FTE based on the OSHA definition of 2,000 work hours per year.

^{*}OSHA recordable injuries are those that result in lost/restricted work time and/or medical treatment.




FY 15-16 True North Safety Dashboard



Employee Injuries LHH FY 15-16: **11.6** Per 100 FTE | Goal: Zero recordable employee Injuries








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Recordable Injury Rates by Job Category
















Top Ten Types of Injury in 2015-16









Where are injuries occurring?














Which activities are causing the injuries?








History of Resident Handling Injuries







- Safe Resident Handling
 - Investigate root causes of the high number of these injuries
 - Implement countermeasures
 - Develop policy and procedures
- Restructure Health and Safety Training to Appropriate Level
 - Health and safety orientation and refresher training courses
 - Specific to job function and associated hazards/regulatory requirements
 - In-person training to the extent feasible
