SF Behavioral Health Center (SFBHC) provides locked subacute inpatient treatment and residential care for adults and seniors who have behavioral health needs

Third floor: Mental Health Rehabilitation Center (MHRC) 47 beds

Second floor: Residential Care Facility for the Elderly (RCFE) 59 beds

First floor: Adult Residential Care Facility (ARF) 55 beds

- -14 were repurposed for Hummingbird in Feb 2019, leaving 41
- -Hummingbird 29 beds (15 + 14)





MHRC: A locked sub-acute treatment facility for behavioral health clients

RCFE: A "Board & Care" similar to the ARF, for adults 60 and over

Hummingbird Place: innovative psychiatric respite with day programs and overnight stays for patients who have been in behavioral health crises and are contemplating their next step on the road to recovery





- Provides 24-hour-a-day non-medical care and supervision to adults 18-59 years who have severe mental illnesses that are stable yet are still in need of care and supervision
- Services include: housekeeping, supervision, personal care assistance, and help with medications that residents selfadminister
- Residents are referred to the ARF from acute care services, locked subacute and other board and cares
- Licensed by Community Care Licensing under California Department of Social Services





ARF challenges over recent years:

- Medication errors, resident safety, resident respect
 - Multiple State citations and plans of correction from 2015-2018
 - Noncompliance conference due to multiple and repeated citations
 - Non-compliance Plan of Correction 2018
- Staffing concerns
- At risk of losing license



Actions Taken for Resident Safety



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- Resident safety and respect
 - Plans of Correction (2015 2018)
 - Staff trainings and audits (2015-ongoing)
 - Staff coaching and counseling (2015-2018)
- Staffing concerns
 - HR meetings to focus on staff vacancies (Jan 2017ongoing)

DPH decision to suspend admissions in 2018 until able to ensure resident safety and demonstrate quality improvement. Current census: 32.





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DPH asked the state to suspend (not relinquish) 27 ARF beds in May 2019

- State approved
- Combined with previous Hummingbird Place expansion (14 beds), there are 41 out of 55 licensed ARF beds in suspense
- 14 ARF beds remain for clients
- 18 ARF residents offered relocation from first floor to second floor or a different placement based on preference

Key issues considered in the decision to suspend beds:

- Resident safety and regulatory compliance challenges
- Staff conduct challenges
- Hiring challenges



- Re-assign beds in the BHC and allow vacant space on first floor to be used for care of homeless clients
- No residents would be evicted
- No DPH staff would lose employment
- The ARF improvements could continue
- The ARF is not closed



Hummingbird Place Expansion



Hummingbird Place opened in 2017 with 15 beds, and expanded by 14 beds in February 2019

- Served more than 500 clients
- Offers discharge destination from PES for patients not currently accepting voluntary treatment
- ~30% of Hummingbird referrals are from PES
- Clients are homeless with behavioral health crises
- Hummingbird fills a critical gap in our system



Communication with Union, Staff, and Residents



- Union received notification and offer to meet (July)
 - Listening session 10/1
- Staff were informed at meetings (July)
- Residents were informed with letters and one-on-one conversations (August)

DPH did not do an adequate job communicating with staff and residents

- · Result: rumors, misinformation, anxiety, fear
- Improve our communications:
- Director's Message to DPH staff 9/16
- Director's Statement to SF community 9/20
- Health Commission 10/1



Where we are now and next steps



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- Changes at the BHC are on hold while the Mayor and Board of Supervisors talk about how to proceed in a way that accomplishes our shared goals of resident safety, stability and expanded access to services.
 - All residents have a choice, and if any prefer to move to an equivalent facility in the community or at the BHC, we will work with them
 - No DPH staff at the BHC are losing their jobs
 - No further action or decisions on bed reassignment until the City deliberates
 - DPH Performance Improvement Plan



- Resident safety is our top priority
- Director of Health called for a Performance Improvement Plan for the ARF
- Currently in development, will occur regardless of the bed allocation decisions
- We will achieve a BHC with culture, staffing and safety at the highest level for all who receive care there
